Authorizer Information

Name of Authorizing Organization: Student Achievement Minnesota LLC

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Authorizer Summary:

Student Achievement Minnesota LLC (SAM), established in 2010, is a "single-purpose authorizer": by law, it conducts no activities other than authorizing public charter schools.

SAM's mission is to improve student achievement through quality authorization of charter schools. Its vision is to authorize high-quality charter schools demonstrated to increase student achievement when measured against resident district or state average performance.

SAM welcomes existing and developing organizations with programs demonstrated to improve student achievement to apply to SAM for authorization.

In 2017, SAM authorized three charter schools serving 944 students:

NECP - Northeast College Prep, a K through five inner city school located in Northeast Minneapolis is in its third year of operation serving 260 students. The school continues its growth trajectory of adding an additional grade each year, up to 8th grade. In 2017, NECP moved into its permanent location. The new facility fostered a 40% increase in student enrollment compared to the previous year. The school's reputation in the community continues to spread, resulting in high interest and increased enrollment.

MSA- Math and Science Academy, a six through twelve suburban school located in Woodbury is in its seventeenth-year of operation. Student enrollment is strong peaking at 515. Interest remains strong, the school's waiting list continues to grow, and school diversity continues to increase; 41%. Consistently, MSA significantly outperforms the local district and the state average in reading, math, and science proficiency on state assessments. ACT results indicate students are highly prepared for college coursework.

WSS- West Side Summit, a K through six, inner city school located in West St. Paul is in its fourth year of operation providing service to 165 students. WSS is home to a large Hispanic student population. The school launched middle school during 2017-2017. The school's extended school day supports academic initiatives.

Contributions to SAM are tax deductible under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and SAM is registered with the Minnesota Attorney General's office.

SAM continuously assesses its authorizing processes and practices to ensure its school are being adequately serviced and that its practices are aligned with NACSA standards for quality authorizing. A needs assessment is done to identify authorizing deficiencies and to determine professional development opportunities. SAM and Friends of Education routinely compare and contrast practices, processes, and outcomes sought to maximize authorizing effectiveness.

SAM's school portfolio size did not change; thus, no changes in staffing.

SAM is a member of the MN Association of Charter School Authorizers (MACSA) and regularly participates in the organization's monthly meetings where other school authorizers gather to share information, brainstorm, problem solve and advocate for high- quality authorizing. SAM meets with Friends of Education on a regular basic to discuss authorizing strengths, successes, challenges, and areas in need of attention and improvement.

SAM accepted an invitation to present at the 2017 National Association of Charter School Authorizers Conference in Atlanta: Lessons Learned as a School Leader that Help as an Authorizer.

Charter School Support, Development, and Technical Assistance (B.7)

SAM provides direct technical assistance and professional development opportunities to its authorized schools. Technical assistance is not required and is provided free of charge. Professional development

offerings are generally based on needs identified by our schools. SAM monitors the impact of professional development provided.

Direct Technical Assistance

SAM retained a 0.2 consultant to assist schools with instructional coaching, data driven instruction, and data analysis. West Side Summit utilized this service to boost the implementation of data driven instruction, teacher development and coaching.

SAM Website Depository

SAM added a professional development depository to its website to promote instructional best practices. The depository includes power point presentations, student work examples, and recommended readings.

SAM Provided PD to School

SAM works in collaboration with Friends of Education to plan and provide valued professional development opportunities for its schools. School input is solicited to determine relevant topics/subjects.


World's Best Workforce

SAM believes the WBWF is principal because it provides insight into whether schools are making strides to increase the student performance based on key points and benchmarks. WBWF measurers are included in charter contracts and school oversight: Closing the Achievement Gap (FRL, ELL and Spec Ed); 3rd Grade Reading Level; College Readiness/ACT; State Assessment and Proficiency Greater than State Average; and Graduation Rate (if applicable).

SAM monitors student learning and achievement through the review of board minutes, annual report, site visit reports, required assessments and WBWF. Additionally, SAM monitors how the governing board is informed of student achievement and WBWF progress.


World Best Workforce Goal: All Third Graders Can Read at Grade Level

NECP and WSS struggle to achieve the third-grade reading goal of all third graders reading at grade level. In situations like this academic oversight is scrutinized, expectations reinforced, and technical support offered to improve student learning.



World Best Workforce Goal: Graduation Rate and College Readiness

MSA's ACT results show students are performing substantially higher in all subject areas compared to the state; a composite score differential of 5.3. MSA exceeds the state's graduation rate by more than 10%. On the Minnesota State assessments, MSA demonstrates an average proficiency rate of 20% above the state average in all content areas.



Academic Performance

Present outcome data regarding key academic performance indicators your organization used when evaluating your portfolio of charter schools. Provide a narrative analysis of this data, indicating strengths and areas for improvement.

SAM's three school portfolio is skewed. The secondary school is mature, highly successful, and consistently demonstrates stellar academic performance. The two elementary schools who have been in operation less than five years, struggle to find solid footing and direction because of leadership turnover and rapid expansion. The elementary schools are repeatedly informed about the need to improve student learning. SAM's observations suggest deficiencies in the alignment of curriculum/standards, data driven instruction implementation, and expectations of students. An ongoing discussion with our schools is how to become more effective in meeting the needs of the school's diverse student body.

SAM schools do a great job displaying fidelity to their mission and vision. Schools are demonstrating increased commitment to data driven instruction and recognize its value and importance. As best practice schools administer a needs assessment in support of the academic program and teacher development. Technical support is provided by the authorizer per school request.

NECP and WSS must improve submitting mandated reports by the due date. Compliance is not always timely. Maintaining the school's website with updated information presents a problem for the schools too.

Financial Performance

All of SAM school's external financial audits for FY2017 were "clean"; no material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Two- thirds of SAM's schools received the State Finance Award. A monthly review of finance reports indicates all schools are fiscally responsible in managing cash flow.

For NECP and WSS an area in need of improvement includes growing the fund balance to assure fiscal viability and charter contract compliance. Enrollment shortfalls and rapid expansion significantly impacted growing the fund balance.
